# RECOGNISED REGIONAL INTEGRATION

#### FREE TRADE AGREEMENTS

Tunisia has signed 52 non double taxation agreements and 54 bilateral agreements for the promotion and protection of investments. In addition, Tunisia has signed free trade agreements include:

- A free trade area agreement with EFTA countries (EU, Iceland, Liechtenstein, Norway and Switzerland)
- The Agadir Free Trade Agreement between Jordan, Egypt, Morocco and Tunisia,
- A bilateral agreement with Turkey establishing a free-trade area,
- A bilateral free trade area agreements with Libya, Egypt, Morocco, Jordan and Iraq,
- An agreement establishing the Pan Arab Free Trade Area with 18 countries of the League of Arab States.
- The COMESA trade agreement (Tunisia is the 20<sup>th</sup> member since 2020).

# ADVANCED PARTNER WITH EUROPE




- Tunisia is the first country in the southern Mediterranean to have signed an Association and Free Trade Agreement with the European Union
- Tunisia also has the status of **Advanced Partner with the European Union**. This status is set to strengthen trade liberalisation and economic integration
- The signing of a **Deep and Comprehensive Free Trade Agreement** (DCFTA) is underway to ensure the progressive integration of Tunisia into the EU internal market and the building of a Common Economic Space.



### **AFCFTA AGREEMENT**

Tunisia signed the African Continental Free Trade Area (AfCFTA) agreement in July 2020, and is actively working to implement it in order to strengthen its competitiveness and enhance its trade potential in Africa.

Tunisia has already issued 93 certificates of origin under the AfCFTA agreement to facilitate the export of chemical products, agri-food products and semi-automatic machinery to several countries. The certificate of origin is considered as a key factor for the effective implementation of the agreement: it entitles exporting companies to reductions in customs duties, which are due to be removed from the 1st of January 2026.



### **Transport infrastructure**

- 9 international airports operating more than 2 000 weekly flights serving about 50 cities around the world.
- 7 commercial ports and 1 oil terminal with a monthly frequency of 62 regular lines.
- 1 deep-water port under construction.
- A railway network serving the main cities of the country.
- A road network of about **20 000 Km** of roads and more than **500 km** of motorways connecting all Tunisian cities.

### **Technological infrastructure**

- 2 business parks in Bizerte and Zarzis
- A **park exclusively dedicated** to aerospace industry in El Mghira
- +150 developed industrial zones spread across the country

Over the past few years, ICTs and their ecosystem have become a national priority. They have been enhanced by a wealth of initiatives and programs to support entrepreneurship in this field.

The performance recorded in this sector, particularly in the area of digital infrastructures, testifies to this trend.

- 13 incubators/accelerators supporting entrepreneurs at the very start of their ideas and offering a wide range of services.
- 19 cyber parks entirely dedicated to innovative start-ups.
- 47 Coworking / Fablabs providing access to digital production tools.



The outcome of this proactive policy can be seen in the creation of several technology parks, the construction of numerous submarine connections, particularly with Europe, the creation of call centres and the establishment of regional and national offices of major international groups.

In response to global energy challenges, Tunisia has adopted a strategy with ambitious targets for energy efficiency and renewable energy. The country aims to reduce primary energy consumption by 30 % and to increase the share of renewable energy in the electricity supply to 30 % by 2030.

Tunisia has launched an ambitious new strategy based on a vision that is aligned with its Paris Agreement commitments. This comprehensive approach addresses the energy sector from a climate, economic, and social perspective.

# **INVESTMENT-FRIENDLY**

### REGULATIONS



- Total freedom of foreign equity participation for offshore companies,
- Reduction in the number of authorisations and review of specifications,
- Free access to land ownership for investment purposes,
- Guarantees of fair and equitable treatment and the protection of industrial and intellectual property for investors,
- Freedom to transfer funds (profits, dividends and assets) abroad.

#### TAX AND FINANCIAL INCENTIVES:

- Total exemption from VAT and customs duties on the inputs of the products to be re-exported,
- Total exemption of profits for up to 10 years for companies located in regional development zones, followed by a reduced rate of 10 % after the exemption period,
- Premium of up to 30 % of the investment cost, capped at 3 million TND for companies located in regional development zones,
- **Premium** for intangible investment and research and development expenditure of up **50 % of costs,** capped at TND 500,000 and TND 300,000 respectively,
- Investment premium of 15 % of the costs, capped at 1 MTND, granted for priority sectors and economic sectors,
- **Subsidy** of the employer's statutory contribution during the first 3 years of effective activity for employees of Tunisian nationality recruited for a first permanent job,
- **Subsidy** of the cost of training programmes leading to certification representing **up to 70** % of the cost of the initial training and capped at 20,000 TND.

The Finance Law 2024 introduced significant changes and incentives designed to stimulate the national economy and boost entrepreneurship in Tunisia.

These provisions offer major tax incentives and are aimed at new individual businesses or companies undertaking innovative investment projects in 2024 and 2025.

Specific regulations and procedures govern intellectual property rights. They are consolidated by the law on the protection of personal data.

Tunisia is a member of **ICSID** (International Centre for Settlement of Investment Disputes).



# **RESPONSIBLE**

### COMMITMENT \_\_\_

Tunisia has designed a sustainable development policy inspired by the United Nations' sustainable development roadmap, which includes a set of 17 global goals to be achieved by 2030.

In order to accelerate its development, Tunisia has identified 10 priority goals, focusing mainly on:

- Dedicating the country's resources to inclusive, sustainable, resilient and job-creating socio-economic development.
- Reducing inequality in all its forms.
- Guaranteeing access to health, education and drinking water.
- Encouraging decent work.
- Implementing measures to combat climate change.

Corporate Social Responsibility was expressly incorporated into the country's legal framework by law in June 2018, which made it an obligation incumbent on businesses and other institutions.
